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Free January Program

January 15, 2015 – 7 pm, Robert K. "Murph" Murphy *Movement Ecology of Golden Eagles from the Four Corners Region based on Satellite Telemetry*

Shortages of data on survival rates, mortality factors, habitat selection, and dispersal and migration movements hinder decisions for managing golden eagle populations in the western U.S. To help fill these information gaps, he and his colleagues fitted 83 golden eagle nestlings with satellite transmitters in the Southern Rockies/Colorado Plateau region during 2010-2014. Nearly one-half million hourly GPS locations of the eagles, accurate to within 20 m, have been collected via the Argos satellite system. He will provide an overview of findings to date. This data will be crucial to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in granting wind turbine permits.

Robert K. "Murph" Murphy is a wildlife Biologist for U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service's National Wildlife Refuges in western North Dakota (1993-2006), Assistant Professor in Biology at University of Nebraska-Kearney (2006-2010), Wildlife Biologist for Service's Division of Migratory Birds since summer 2010. A transplanted northerner, he has spent most of my life in North Dakota and adjoining states.

February 19, 2015 – 7 pm, Margaret "Peggy" Darr *Will Climate Change Affect Nature's Marathon Migrants?*

Climate change will negatively affect many bird species, including some of the world's most impressive long-distance migrants: shorebirds. Many shorebirds breed in the Arctic, a region that has and will continue to experience dramatic changes due to climate change. Breeding areas are not the only shorebird habitats threatened by climate change. Shorebirds are long-distance migrants dependent upon wetland stop-over sites. In arid New Mexico, climate change will most likely result in longer, more severe drought periods, which will result in less

stop-over wetland habitat for shorebirds. Learn more about migratory shorebirds, and the challenges they will face as a result of climate change.

Peggy Darr is the new Nongame Avian Biologist for the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. Peggy has a master's degree in wildlife biology from Louisiana State University and a bachelor's degree in environmental studies from the University of Vermont. Prior to her position with NMDGF, Peggy spent three years managing a nature preserve near San Antonio, Texas, and two years as the Coordinator of Nature Tours/O ornithologist on the King Ranch in Kingsville, Texas. Peggy has conducted field research with multiple bird species including: Piping Plovers and Least Terns in Massachusetts; Northern Spotted Owls in Washington; Attwater's Prairie-Chickens, Golden-cheeked Warblers, and Black-capped Vireos in Texas; Ducks and Shorebirds in North Dakota; and Henslow's Sparrows in Louisiana. Peggy has presented on numerous bird and wildlife topics, including a presentation on migratory shorebirds at the Kachemak Bay Shorebird Festival in Homer, Alaska.

March 19, 2015 – 7 pm Kathy Granillo and Kirsten Cruz-McDonnell *New Mexico's Grassland Birds*

Grassland habitat hosts a wide variety of species – many of which have been identified as species of concern. Kathy Granillo will provide an overview of New Mexico's grassland birds – those that breed in our grasslands, those that stop here during migration and those who winter in New Mexico. She will place a special emphasis on species in Sevilleta NWR. Kirsten will focus on one of the most beloved grassland species – the Burrowing Owl -- talking about the negative effects of rapid warming and drought on reproductive dynamics and population size.

Kathy Granillo is the Refuge Manager at Sevilleta NWR, where she has worked since 2010. Prior to that, since 1992, she worked in the Southwest Region office of the US Fish and Wildlife Service as the Regional Refuge Biologist. She has a BS in Forestry from the University of California Berkeley, and a MS in Wildlife Resources from the University of Idaho.

Kirsten Cruz-McDonnell is a biologist with Envirollogical Services, Inc., a New Mexican non-profit, and she conducts research projects with raptors and other grassland birds. She received her M.S. in Biology from the University of New Mexico in 2014.

April 16, 2015, 7 pm, Bill Talbot
Adaptations of Desert Birds

More prolonged and intense heat waves and droughts are part of climate change predictions. Desert birds already live on the edge of temperatures compatible with survival. How have they adapted to these conditions and can they tolerate increased environmental challenge? Bill has traveled to the southern hemisphere to learn more about survival strategies of desert birds and how that information can be applied to birds of the Sonoran desert here in New Mexico. Bill will share some of what he has learned.

Bill Talbot is currently a student in the graduate biology program at the University of New Mexico. His dissertation research involves the thermal biology of warm-bodied, flying and nocturnal homeotherms (i.e. owls, goatsuckers, and bats) of the Sonoran Desert. In addition, Bill is an expert and bander of hummingbirds in New Mexico.


The Center for Car Donations is one of the easiest organizations I have ever worked with for both the donor and the organization receiving the gift.

DECEMBER 4

Hike Rinconada Canyon in the Petroglyph National Monument with Sara Jayne Cole: birdlajoya@gmail.com, 505-554-1665. Meet at 9:00 a.m. in the trailhead parking lot on the west side of Unser Boulevard NW where Unser intersects with St. Joseph's Avenue. The walk will be about two miles long on a trail that is relatively flat but is composed of soft sand. It should end before noon.

DECEMBER 11

Walk around the Tingley bosque ponds with Becky Purvis: 505-877-2517, rpurvis3@ayhoo.com. Meet at 9:00 a.m. in the Tingley Ponds main parking lot. To reach the area, drive west on Central Avenue past Rio Grande Boulevard, then turn left on Tingley Drive. Take the first turn to the parking lot near the concession stand. The walk will be about one mile in length and will end before noon.

DECEMBER 18

Hike up Bear Canyon with Rebecca Gracey: 505-242-3821, maryrebeccagracey@gmail.com, followed by a holiday potluck lunch at the home of Liz and Larry Kuo. Meet at 10:00 a.m. in the Michael Emery Trailhead parking lot east of Tramway on Spain. (Spain is north of Montgomery and south of Paseo del Norte.) Follow Spain until it ends on High Desert. Lunch will be at the Old Mill in Estancia. The group should be back in Tijeras in the late afternoon. For those not driving the shared gas expense is \$5 at five cents per mile.

Movement Ecology of Golden Eagles from the Four Corners Region based on Satellite Telemetry

Shortages of data on survival rates, mortality factors, habitat selection, and dispersal and migration movements hinder decisions for managing golden eagle populations in the western U.S. To help fill these information gaps, he and his colleagues fitted 83 golden eagle nestlings with satellite transmitters in the Southern Rockies/Colorado Plateau region during 2010-2014. He will provide an overview of findings to date. This data will be crucial to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in granting wind turbine permits.

Will Climate Change Affect Nature's Marathon Migrants?

Climate change will negatively affect many bird species, including some of the world's most impressive long-distance migrants: shorebirds. Many shorebirds breed in the Arctic, a region that has and will continue to experience dramatic changes due to climate change. Shorebirds are long-distance migrants dependent upon wetland stop-over sites. In arid New Mexico, climate change will most likely result in longer, more severe drought periods, which will result in less stop-over wetland habitat for shorebirds. Learn more about migratory shorebirds, and the challenges they will face as a result of climate change.


